At the October 5 meeting, the Health Committee presented special guest speaker Jessica Levity from the Alchemist Theatre to inform us about PODS for Pads. We learned many girls are missing over a week of school due to not having access to hygiene pads and lack of education.

Christopher Daniels, creator of the Alchemist Theatre says “This is a massive problem that absolutely no one is talking about.” The Alchemist Theatre and Northern Nevada HOPES have partnered together on this issue and are currently collecting hygiene pads for young girls who cannot afford them. Their goal is to fill an 8x8 storage POD during the month of October with feminine products for local school girls in need.

Sewing machines of members and friends are humming and the numbers of patterned dresses for the “Dress a Girl” project are growing. More than four dozen dresses have been completed, with a couple of dozen more underway. Here is an update and some highlights of Dress a Girl progress.

- Member Jan Bogikes’ sewing friends completed 12 dresses, plus 12 additional “sewing packets” containing instructions, material cut for one dress, plus binding, elastic and DAG label. All 12 packets were picked up by members.
- Former member Jan Veys donated nine bolts of fabric for the dresses.

These are available for members to use for sewing dresses.

- \$50 in donations have been received and will be used to purchase panties to accompany the dresses and Ziplock bags for the project. Depending upon the amount of donations, at the end of the project members may be able to request reimbursement for materials.

Thanks to everyone who has been sewing dresses, enlisting family and friends to join you, or making monetary donations. “Sewing Packets”, bolts of fabric, DAG guidelines and a little moral support is available at each Thursday meeting at the Fundraising Table.

What an adventure this is going to be! Steve and I started planning our trip about a year ago and have fortunately been able to accommodate the necessary changes so far. We were initially told our girls were going to be in the school the beginning of October so we booked our flights and accommodations accordingly and coordinated with our local contact

With the language barrier we have been translating our questionnaires and forms in both English and Nepali. Gratefully, due to the internet this has been fairly easy to do. We have also

downloaded the several translations apps on our phones in hopes this will make communication easier for us.


for early October. We then later found out this was not correct and that the girls would not be there which really defeated the purpose of our visit. Fortunately, upon receiving this news we were able to rearrange our work schedules and rebook all our flights and accommodations for a month later.

The next thing we had to do was make sure all of our vaccines were current and get any that were not. We also got all the necessary travel prescriptions filled that we hope will not be needed, but definitely important to have just in case. The "just in case" happened two weeks before our trip when we found out our local contact/guide has been ill with typhoid, but doing much better now after being treated and rest. Typhoid was not something we had thought about or discussed at the travel clinic as a concern, but upon hearing this news we had typhoid medication prescribed as a precautionary. Let's hope there

local contact, Shyam Paudel. He recommended that we stay at the Fishtail Lodge before and after our visit to our dormitory. We fully agreed with his recommendation! This lodge is an endowed non-profit organization called Jayanti Memorial Trust (JMT). All profits generated by the Lodge support the trust's goals, which are to provide funding to less fortunate heart patients who are economically weak, and provide them cardiac care.

We are grateful that Shyam has taken four days off from his work to spend with us to take us to the dormitory and to share with us this beautiful area of the world. Shyam highly recommended that we do a 1 ½ day Ghandruk Trek with him along the Annapurna range following our stay at the dormitory which we of course immediately said "yes" to. Shyam says "it is the most alluring place I ever trekked".

Thank you to everyone who has donated items including scarves, clothing, toiletries and school supplies for us to bring. And thank you to the IGU committee for supporting our

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trip by purchasing shirts with the Soroptimist logo.

Thank you also to the IGU committee for separating and packing the gifts and supplies for us to bring with us on our adventure! What a tremendous help this was!

Our biggest challenge now is getting all this "stuff" on our commuter flight between Kathmandu and Pokhara. Please wish us luck!

We also can't thank member Jeanne Baxter enough for all of her help. Jeanne helped make all our arrangements to get to Thulipokhari and put us in contact with all the right people to make this trip possible.

We look forward to sharing with everyone upon our return lots of pictures and stories about the difference we/SITM are making in this part of the world. Namaste!



# IGU/SITM Receives a \$14,000 SI Grant!

What exciting news to share! The IGU committee recently submitted an application for the Soroptimist International President's Appeal "Educate to Lead: Nepal" and received a \$14,000 grant!

These funds will be used to build a computer lab for the Janata Sudarshan Campus and Janata Sudarshan Secondary school to share with the village of Thulipokhari, Nepal. We are very excited about this opportunity to add to the level of literacy for the girls and women in the village. Great job SITM!!

SITM was one of three recipients in 2016 of a \$20,000 grant from the SI President's project. The grant

is helping fund 20 girls to pursue a baccalaureate program beyond our current high school education and dormitory housing.

SI President Yvonne Simpson, SIA President Susan "Sam" Collier Buchenau and SIA Past Presidents Cheri Fleming and Sharon Fisher visited SITM in March 2016. At the same time, SITM hosted Guru Prasad Subedi, Chairman of the IGU Scholarship

Committee, his wife Nundakali and son Mahesh, all from Thulipokhari, Nepal, along with Purna Subedi (no relation) who grew up in Thulipokhari and was brought to the United States in the early 1980s by Jeanne Baxter to attend the University of Nevada, Reno.

Two new members were inducted at the October Business Meeting. Jessica Coggins, an Independent Damsel Pro with Damsel in Defense, was sponsored by Jennifer Burnitt. Darlene Delancey is a Registered Nurse, sponsored by Dot Watts. Welcome Jessica and Darlene.

The SITM Board recommended members approve several motions from committees as they ramp up their activities for the new club year.

### Consider Donating to PODS for Pads.

On a request from the Health Committee, the membership approved members' participation in the "PODS for Pads" program, initiated by Alchemist Theatre and Northern Nevada Hopes. Members are asked to donate feminine products for local school girls who are missing school once a month because they cannot afford, or for other reasons cannot obtain items such as sanitary napkins. The goal is to fill a storage POD. Bring donations to club meetings that will be collected by Health Co-Coordinator Chris Fegert.

### Crocheting Afghans and Wrapping Christmas Presents

The Economic and Social Development Committee brought two motions to the membership at the October Business Meeting. The membership approved the committee's request to once again encourage members to crochet afghans for the Volunteers of America Homeless Shelter in Reno. Watch for additional announcements about upcoming "Afghan Socials" for members to gather together to learn how to crochet, or just enjoy each other's company while crocheting. For those who don't crochet, the committee accepts donations of yarn that other members will crochet into afghans.

The committee also received board and membership approval to solicit members willing to wrap Christmas presents again this year for the Salvation Army's Silver Angel Tree for seniors. Dates, usually a Friday and Saturday before Christmas, will be announced as determined by the Salvation Army.

### Gifts for Hunter Lake Elementary School Students

A motion by the Education – Youth Committee was approved by the board and membership to solicit members to shop for and purchase gifts for an additional 25 underprivileged children at Hunter Lake Elementary. (A local church is also contributing gifts for 25 students.) The committee will be working with the school to compile

The Making a Difference for Women Committee announced this year's skills training seminar will be held January 31 at the Atlantis. The membership also approved the use of SITM's Go Fund Me account, YouCaring, to solicit donations that could be used for grants to women attending the annual session. Small grants are offered to seminar graduates who are in need of things like refurbished laptops for school, clothing like medical scrubs, or specialty footwear like boots, or bus passes, all aimed to get them to work.



## Thank You SITM Members for your Generous Donations

The Health Committee held a toiletries drive for Northern Nevada HOPES clients in May-June 2017. Everything from small travel-sized toiletries, to larger family-sized items intended for many homeless clients were donated by members. According to Health Committee Co-Coordinator Chris Fegert, the cash equivalent of the donated items was estimated at \$375.00.

To illustrate the need in the community, Chris provided some statistics about HOPES clients and services



Some of the homeless clients of HOPES receive these "CITYPAK" back packs, which can be filled with toiletries and other essentials.

- Approximately 27% of HOPES patients are experiencing homelessness.
- 67% of HOPES patients are on Medicare/Medicaid
- When you donate to HOPES, 95% of every dollar goes directly to programs and services
- 6,729 patients were served – a 62% increase in one year
- 24,636 miles were driven by transportation specialists to deliver medications and drive patients to doctors' appointments
- 317 health insurance enrollments were taken
- 1,935 vaccinations and immunizations were given

According to HOPES, health center Medicaid beneficiaries are 11% less likely to be hospitalized and 19% less likely to use the ER for preventative conditions. The HOPES Solution – When we invest in prevention, businesses benefit. A healthier workforce reduces long term healthcare costs and increases stability and productivity.

## Did you know . . .

### Introducing SI President, Mariet Verhoef-Cohen, 2017 – 2019

During a celebratory meeting on July 29, 2017 at Rotterdam, Mariet Verhoef-Cohen was inaugurated with overwhelming support as President of Soroptimist International (SI) for the 2017 – 2019 biennium; the first Dutch President in the organization's almost 100 years of existence. Mariet Verhoef-Cohen succeeds New Zealand's Yvonne Simpson as International President of the worldwide organization whose membership includes some 75,000 women in over 130 countries.

Mariet is a trained professional translator and owner/ director of Bacolet Translations. As a Soroptimist she was closely involved with a number of international projects. In her role as President SI Europe (2007 – 2009) she introduced the

two-year running theme 'Soroptimists go for Water', which saw countless clubs developing both individual and joint projects aimed at providing access to clean water for women. As President of the Women for Water Partnership (WfWP) she galvanised worldwide attention for the 'Clean Water for Women' theme, coupled with the promotion of gender responsive sanitary provisions. As its President since 2014, she has been a driving force behind the WfWP international network which has tasked itself with providing women with safe access to clean drinking water.
