

In an informative and sometimes shocking presentation, Rechele Murillo outlined some of the issues facing Children in Transition. For example:

Of children in Nevada:

- 1 out of 5 living in poverty.
- 1 out of 4 are food insecure
- 1 out of 3 are living with parents who lack secure employment.

Of the 64,000 students attending Washoe County Schools, 12,000 of them are chronically absent by missing 10% or 18 days of the school year.

Sarah is a lobbyist for the Nevada Coalition to End Domestic and Sexual Violence and Sarah gave an informative overview of nonprofit organizations lobbying, bills of interest to Soroptimists and ideas for how to get involved.

This year's focus is on robotics and computer coding, teaching the girls how to block code


with age-appropriate lessons and demonstrations.

Joining soon-to-be President Penney Leezy for the new Club Year are: President-Elect, Millie Mitchell; Vice President Program, Chris Fegert; Vice President Membership, Valerie Hahn; Secretary, Linda Walker; Treasurer/Service Fund, Ana Nadimi; Delegate, Anna McArdle.

Also joining soon-to-be President Penney will be Treasurer/General Fund, Pam Robinson; and Director, Jeanne Naccarato, who are completing their terms of office. Thanks to all of these members for stepping up to lead SITM in the coming Club Year.

### Proposals for Next Year's Budgets

At the April Business Meeting, Finance/Governance Co-Coordinator Vicki Schultz discussed updates, proposed changes and solicited suggestions for the 2019-2020 General and Service Fund Budgets. The Finance Committee working in conjunction with the Governance Committee is drafting some language to propose three major changes to SITM Policies and Procedures.

1. Establish a reserve policy for the Service and General Funds. Proposed is a \$25,000 reserve, or about two years of fund raising for the Service Fund; and a \$20,000 reserve, or about two years of operating for the General Fund.
2. Establish a "Wish Fund" as a way to put any excess funds to work where committees could request funds to support their already approved projects. These requests would come before the board and membership for approval.
3. Proposing a weekly drawing for a "free lunch" from among those in attendance each week. Funds to cover the cost would come from the General Fund.

### Ending the Ruby Award and Repurposing the Funds to LYD

The Empowerment of Women Committee, which is responsible for administering the Soroptimist Ruby Award: For Women Helping Women made a motion to discontinue the program and repurpose the \$1,000 budget to the Live Your Dream program scholarship. The board recommended and the membership approved the motion.

### Northern Nevada HOPES Receives Happy Dollars

March Happy Dollars, totaling \$346 were collected for Northern Nevada HOPES. HOPES is a nonprofit community health center in downtown Reno. April Happy Dollars are designated for Amplify Life's Camp

Lotsafun, a summer sleep-away camp for children and adults with disabilities at Eagle Lake, California.

The board extended Kathy Hudson's leave of absence through June, for health reasons. Remaining on leave through June is Barbara Atwell, for personal reasons.


