Robotics, “Girls Who Code” Featured January 21

Leigh Metcalfe, Certified Science Teacher from Reed High School will be our January 21 speaker. Leigh is presented by the Dream It, Be It Committee which administers our after-school STEM education for girls program at Hunter Lake Elementary.



Leigh started teaching at Reed in 2008, but eight years ago, while working with the robotics/engineering club, she changed the way she approached teaching. From a handful of students to 28 students today, the students design, build, program and solve problems through robotics. Since the robotics teams have grown over the years, today they boast a ratio of 1:1 girls and boys.

A group of female students in robotics were interested in learning to program together so they formed a “Girls Who Code” club. As a team, the female students use the invention process to develop solutions to local problems. These ideas allow them to apply for contests like Samsung Solve for Tomorrow and the Lemelson-MIT InvenTeams grants.

You’ll want to hear about some of the award-winning projects these high school students have developed with the guidance of their teacher Leigh Metcalfe.

Communities in Schools Featured February 18

Tami Hance-Lehr, CEO and State Director of Communities in School (CIS) of Nevada will speak at our February 18 meeting. Mark your calendars!

Founded in 2004, CIS of Nevada is a single non-profit with three dependent affiliates serving over 70,000 students at 75 school campuses, in four school districts across the state. Communities In Schools of Nevada believes every child has potential but may lack the opportunity to succeed and places caring, well-trained, full-time employees in high poverty schools to build trusted relationships with students, assess their needs and remove the barriers they face to learn, stay in school and graduate. In 2020 CIS of Nevada had a statewide graduation rate of 90% for their case-managed students, and 98% for their academy students.

Tami has over 30-years of leadership, strategic planning, crisis management, relationship building, and communication skills. Prior to joining CIS, Tami was the leading vice president and shareholder of Destinations by Design, the largest and foremost hospitality event company in Nevada. Previously, she was president of Nevada Women’s Philanthropy, and the Las Vegas Hospitality Association. She was awarded a leadership badge by the Girl Scouts of Southern Nevada in 2016, and currently serves on the board of directors for Nevada Community Foundation.



LYD Recipients to be Honored February 4

Be sure to invite guests to our upcoming Live Your Dream Awards Zoom luncheon on Thursday, February 4. Our club received 12 applications, and there are some very outstanding women! We have also invited a past Live Your Dream Award recipient to share her story and successes with us, and hope she can join us.

Soroptimist International of America has been empowering women through access to education since 1972 through the Live Your Dream Program and has disbursed more than \$30 million to 30,000 women who have overcome life challenges and determined to turn their lives around. Soroptimist invests in women's education because it transforms lives and communities. Our program has been recognized for its effectiveness and long-term impact.



Every year, Soroptimist distributes more than \$2 million in education grants to about 1,500 women all over the world. SITM has awarded nearly \$35,000 to 34 women since 1998. The Live Your Dream award is intended for women who are the primary financial support of themselves and their dependents, have a financial need, and are enrolled or accepted into a vocational/skills training program or an undergraduate degree program.

From this front page, bidders can discover “Who We Are”, detailing our club activities, affiliates and projects. Visitors can also make an immediate donation in any amount to SITM. Or, visitors can register to bid on

auction items, make a donation or view our **Fund a Need** projects. (See sample on page 5)

A Live Demonstration Coming January 28

Pre-Registration process

The auction site will be opened early so you can pre-register in advance and you’ll be ready to bid on February 4. Once you input some basic information, you’ll receive an email with a link to download the FREE GIVI app from the Apple Store or Google Play Store. That will allow you to create an account by entering a 6-digit ticket code.

Once completed, you’re ready to join the action. Click on the event -- Whole Hearted Online Auction – and you are ready to bid, donate and learn more about SITM.

Live Your Dream Scholarships for women pursuing an undergraduate degree or vocational skills training program who has primary financial responsibility for herself and dependents. \$1,000 scholarships awarded annually.



STEAM Day is a one-day workshop for middle school-aged girls introducing them to professions and projects in Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Math. \$400 will support the day's costs for five girls to attend.



Dream It, Be It program for elementary girls to learn computer coding in after school STEAM lessons and experiences. \$250 will support an additional educational robot and curriculum.



Thanks to Youth is an awards program that honors exceptional youth through scholarships to deserving high school seniors, plus recognizes "Unsung Heroes" who are ordinary youth doing extraordinary deeds for their community, school, church or family.



Fresh from the holidays and with the start of a new year SITM has not slowed down at all.

Suspending In-Person Meetings for Another Two Months

Nevada Governor Steve Sisolak has once again extended the “pause” he invoked in November that limits gathering, dining choices and encouraged people to quarantine in place for another month as positive cases of COVID-19 remain high in the state. Against that backdrop, the Board recommended and the membership approved continuing to suspend in-person meetings for two months, until March 11. With an eye towards the progress of vaccinations and future orders from the Nevada Governor, virtual meeting on Zoom will be continued until then.

100th Anniversary Special Committee Underway

President Millie Mitchell appointed a special committee to explore and implement a project for SITM to celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the founding of Soroptimist on October 3, 1921 in Oakland, California. President-Elect Valerie Hahn is coordinating the committee and

presented a motion that was recommended by the Board and approved by the members to set-aside \$500 in seed money for the Soroptimist 100 project. Joining President-Elect Valerie are Chris Fegert, Margie Hermanson, Holly Nash, Penney Leezy, and Sarah Carrasco. If you are interested in joining this

committee, contact President-Elect Valerie. Members ideas are also welcome. The committee will present their findings, plus plan a kick-off for April 15.
