Beads of Strength 100 Seconds in Soroptimist History

In 2009. Our club was approached by the then President of Soroptimist International of Susanville, with a new project. The inspiration of this project was from visits she made to the Oncology Unit at Renown Hospital in Reno with her mother, who was receiving infusion treatments there at the time. As she was waiting for her mother, she noticed women coming out of their final treatment, happy to be done, but tired and in pain. There was no celebration of their having completed that huge milestone in their treatment, and she felt they looked alone and needed encouragement.

The idea behind the project was wonderful: Celebrating the fact that patients had "graduated" from their chemo program at Renown, and encouraging them to move on with their lives. As the Susanville club was able to work it, members would purchase necklaces, specially marketed by Avon for cancer patients, and package them to present to women who were just finishing up their chemo treatment. They partnered with one of the nurses in the Oncology Center at Renown. The thought was that several clubs would get together to help with this project. I believe she found other clubs to help her, but our club at that time was looking for a hands-on project.

Sadly, her mother died soon afterwards and her Susanville club's involvement did as well. The nurse at the Oncology Unit started making handmade bracelets for "graduating" patients, and the president of our club at that time heard about the nurse's work. Beaded bracelets sounded like a good hands-on project, so SITM partnered with the nurse and has been making bracelets (and now key rings for gentlemen) for chemo graduates for over 10 years. The nurses and patients at Renown Oncology Center appreciate our efforts, but the original inspiration for this long-running project must be credited to the ladies of SI/ Susanville. I will however, take credit for the theft of a good idea.

To all of the wonderful jewelry members:

Thank you all so very much for the beautiful jewelry you have made for our infusion center. I'm sure you know we give them to our patients when they finish chemo and it's such a lovely gift and moment for them. It's become a cherished tradition and we so appreciate your time and effort. Many blessings to you!

To date, 22 current SITM members have received the Ceec Abrahams Award.

Seven undergraduate and two graduate women were awarded Dreams Moving Forward scholarships at our May 27 luncheon. Our speaker at the event was Dr. Trudy Larson, founding Dean of the School of Community Health Sciences at UNR. Dr. Larson shared some of the unexpected experiences that led to her becoming a recognized expert in infectious diseases, including HIV/AIDS and most recently COVID. She currently also serves on the governor's medical advisory team for COVID-19. A former member of SI/ Reno, Dr. Larson's remarks were truly inspirational.

Here are some facts about our undergraduate scholarship recipients. Olivia Christie is majoring in

secondary education and political science at TMCC and plans to transfer to UNR in the fall to continue her education. She has been the primary caregiver for her sister and returned to school in August 2019. Kayla Smith is the very first Awaken program graduate and is majoring in Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning (HVAC) at TMCC. She will finish at TMCC in spring of 2022 and is excited to start working as soon as she can. Hazel Wilson returned to UNR in the accelerated BSN nursing program. A former professional skier, she realized early on that she is most fulfilled when being of service to others and decided to return to school. She will graduate in December 2022.

After experiencing some personal difficulties, Ashley Lunt returned to school at TMCC and will complete

her AA in social work. A mom of three, Ashley will transfer to UNR in the fall and plans to become a grant writer and advocate for mothers suffering from addiction. Heidi Marty is enrolled in the TMCC paralegal/law program. She originally studied criminal justice and planned to work as a corrections officer; after an accident caused lasting damage, she found she needed to go into another field.

Heidi works part-time as a legal assistant and plans to transfer to the UNR pre-law program. Nicole Tharp is currently a student at TMCC pursuing her degree in advanced manufacturing and robotics. After touring the TMCC Edison Campus and seeing the robot room, she determined her future career goal. Our final undergraduate is Elizabeth Londner who is enrolled in UNR's accelerated BSN nursing program. She plans to apply for the VA Valor program when she graduates in December and wants to continue her education to become a nurse practitioner or a nursing educator.

Roxana Damian and Ariana Martinez-Davila were awarded graduate scholarships. Both women are enrolled in the UNR physician assistant program and will graduate in August 2022. Roxana is a proud immigrant woman of color and saw the need for Spanish speaking healthcare workers while growing up. She wants to give back to the community that helped raise her.

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She graduated from UNR in 2018 with a degree in neuroscience and minor in mathematics and is the first person in her family to pursue a college degree. Ariana's parents encouraged her to get where she is today. Born in Reno, she has worked hard to create balance in her life and joined the Nevada Area Health Education Center (AHEC) which is focused on gaining clinical and non-clinical knowledge. She wants to help those who are under served because she feels people often just need a little help to succeed.

The Education Women Committee received 27 undergraduate and 16 graduate scholarship applications. After spending many hours reviewing and interviewing, the committee chose these nine talented women to receive \$40,000 in scholarships. Our luncheon was well attended, both in person and on Zoom.

Advice to Our Scholarship Recipients from Dr. Trudy Larson

Dr. Larson offered some advice to the scholarship recipients using anecdotes from her own life and career. Graduating from medical school she began as a practicing pediatrician. By chance she was presented with an opportunity in the field of infectious diseases.

Her advice:

1. When opportunities present themselves, try them and you might be surprised. Saying yes to an "opportunity" began her lifelong career in the field of infectious disease medicine.
2. Never make an enemy, she says. Everyone will not agree on everything, but there will be times when you do agree and could use an ally. But if it does happen, she says, take every opportunity to correct that. Down the road you'll be glad you did, which leads right into her third recommendation.
3. Networks are extremely important and can be very powerful. Her rise to Dean of the School of Community Health Services at the University of Nevada, Reno, was preceded by many appointed county, state, university medical posts, and even nonprofit posts that cemented the network of medical professionals that she relied upon in her position as Dean.

Soroptimist 100th Anniversary – 100 Meals for Hope Springs Project

As of Friday, June 11, SITM is two-thirds, or 64 days into our project to commemorate the 100th Anniversary of Soroptimist by providing 100 Meals to the “neighbors” at Hope Springs, bridge housing for the homeless. Members, friends and some businesses have been providing one meal a day – breakfast, lunch or dinner, to the “neighbors” residing there.

Statistician extraordinaire Doris Phelps is keeping track of all the volunteers, the meals and the donations of cash to the project. So far, she estimates that SITM has donated the equivalent of \$3,720 in prepared meals to the “neighbors”. The number of “neighbors” at any time fluctuates.

The committee has cash contributions it is holding in reserve to start purchasing meals down the road,

especially when the number of resident “neighbors” at Hope Springs approaches their max of 30. We’d like to put off tapping the contribution fund until next month if possible.

If you haven’t already volunteered to help with the 100 Meals for Hope Springs, we could use your help. We’ve got some holes in our calendar for June and July dates. Contact Doris Phelps for information and/or to select a date. A week prior to your selected day for meal delivery, Doris sends a complete instruction list with contact phone numbers and current number of neighbors.

June Board & Business Recap

More end-of-year tasks were on tap for the June Board and Business Meeting as SITM begins to transition from President Millie Mitchell and her Board to Valerie Hahn and her Board.

Are You Attending Meetings via Zoom?

Last month the membership approved charging \$10 per member for those attending the meetings via Zoom. The extra cost is intended to help offset the additional \$90 charge from the Atlantis for providing AV support during the luncheon. There would be no charge for speakers or guests attending via Zoom. The Attendance Committee, General Fund Treasurer and others are working on a mechanism to handle the billing. Standby for more news next month. This charge will be re-evaluated no later than December 31, 2021.

Club Bylaw Amendments Passed

The June Board and Business Meetings also saw the second reading and approval of changes to the Club Bylaws proposed by the Finance/Governance Committee. The amendments bring in-line SITM's Club Bylaws with recent SIA changes, as well as extend a mechanism to begin disciplinary action against members, under the same as it currently exists for members of the Board.

Two Additional Money-Matter Amendments Passed

The Board recommended and the membership passed an amendment to include the two Vice Presidents (VP Programs and VP Membership) as authorized signers on the club's checking accounts.

The Board also recommended and the club approved to hire Bev Perkins, CPA, to prepare the club's federal tax return for the 2020-2021 Club Year.

Buffet or Plated Lunch?

The Atlantis presented a list of lunch prices going forward for 2021-2022. The plated lunch, including gratuity equals \$24.99. The buffet lunch ranges from \$28.00 to \$30.00 depending upon if state/local guidelines require an extra server for the buffet. The Board recommended and the membership approved plated lunches at \$25 per person for Thursday meetings, with the option of requesting a buffet lunch in advance of special meetings.

Members should have received their dues invoice via email. Check your spam folder if you can't find it or email General Fund Treasurer Linda Walker for another copy. (linda@blgift.co (not .com)). Dues are \$203 for regular members. If you're a life member, it's something less and Linda will have that information. Make checks payable to SITM and bring them with you to lunch or mail them to c/o Linda Walker, 3013 Banestone Road, Sparks NV 89436. You can also pay your dues via SITM's "Square" at lunch meetings. There is a cost for using the "Square".

Speakers and Guests on Zoom Only for Now

A directive from Soroptimist International of the Americas requires clubs to remain on a “modified temporary pause” which allows clubs to hold face-to-face activities, but prevents activities that include persons outside local membership, i.e., guests and speakers. In order to host nonmembers, clubs must submit a written declaration form with SIA and obtain a certificate of insurance at least 45 days before the planned event occurs.

Fast acting President Millie filed the appropriate paperwork to allow “outsiders” to attend our May 27 Dreams Moving Forward scholarship luncheon and the upcoming June 24 Installation of New Officers. Members at the June Business meeting also approved a motion to file paperwork with SIA for each upcoming week in order to resume meetings with speakers and guests as soon as possible. Best estimate is this should occur as early as the end of July or early August.

Break These Chains – Live Free; 100 Seconds in Soroptimist History

This 100-second report is on the project started in 2015 in a joint effort (showing what great things we can accomplish when we work together) between the four Las Vegas-area Soroptimist Clubs.

Utilizing a variety of innovative means, including public events, using symbolic dance, flash mobs, songs and symbolism to illustrate the ugly truth about Human Trafficking, these Soroptimists have exponentially increased awareness about Human Trafficking in Southern Nevada.

Using the funds from “Live Free Bracelets and Bears”, they have sponsored high school projects to increase awareness and work with many Southern Nevada agencies providing services to victims and survivors. **Break These Chains – Live Free** is now a separate nonprofit corporation which functions independently

to solicit and track down donations to the cause, and it’s part of the Southern Nevada Anti-Human Trafficking Task Force. Prior to the Pandemic, the organization held an annual high school “Ugly Truth Art Contest”, which was very popular among the Southern Nevada youth. Their continuing efforts in this important area are a testament to their ideals and determination to

improve the lives of women and girls. The current president of the organization is Sarah Walker of SI/Las Vegas Valley.
