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#### A Lifetime of Accounting and Volunteering By Pam Robinson

When KaCe Gilbert was nine, KaCe moved to Reno from Walnut Creek, where she was born. She graduated with honors from Reno High and with distinction from UNR. She was a licensed Certified Public Accountant for many years prior to retirement.



Her first professional job after college was with Deloitte Haskins and Sells, a big 8 accounting firm. She transferred with Deloitte to Las Vegas when she got married, and her first child, Mikaela, was born there.

At the young age of 25, she was hired by Valley Bank as manager of corporate accounting in charge of the tax department and all

non-bank subsidiaries. KaCe said it was a challenge, but she learned so much!

KaCe moved back to Reno and took a position with Grant Thornton, another nationally recognized accounting firm. She then moved back to her previous company, Deloitte Touche, and was recognized by them as a Nevada Women's Fund (NWF) Woman of Achievement and was

## After 30 Years in Prison, A Perspective

Dr. Karen Gedney, MD was the featured speaker at the April 25 meeting, speaking about the historic approach to prison reform, what works and what doesn't work. She is the author of "Thirty Years Behind Bars", an autobiography of her life providing medical care for prisoners at the Northern Nevada Correctional Facility in Carson City.

Dr. Gedney explained that most prisons are run by men operating in a military style aimed at punishment of prisoners. She said she was fortunate to work under three female wardens and assistant wardens that took a different approach to prisoner incarcerations. Two of the three were Soroptimists, including former SITM member Dorothy Nash Holmes.

Through her health diagnoses, research and observation, Dr. Gedney learned that many inmates were broken and "thrown away as kids", abused, or suffered from mental illness. She maintained that helping them heal from part of her company's Women's Initiative Program. Her second child, Hayley, was born here, just 15 months after Mikaela. She also has a son, Bobby, born several years after Mikaela and Hayley.

After returning to Grant Thornton, KaCe was instrumental in developing new staff for all of the tax department programs in the Reno office and specialized in a variety of industries. When she was recognized again as a NWF Woman of Achievement, her employer wrote of her natural ability, integrity,

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dependability, earning the respect of her subordinates, peers, and fellow management team members.

Over the years, KaCe has served on various boards, including Food Bank of Northern Nevada, Nevada Women's Fund, Reno High School Alumni Association, and Junior League of Reno. For fun, she likes to hike, play pickleball and ski. KaCe is a wonderful addition to SITM!

these life-altering events was the beginning of rehabilitation.

With the help of the wardens, she was able to assist with prison reforms as providing life skills for inmates, such as completing their GED, training puppies and wild horses for re-homing. The more long-term, senior inmates were enrolled in culinary classes, along with hobby crafts, even crocheting. The result was a

dramatic reduction in violence within the prison.

The other problem she saw was the lack of support for inmates released into society, sometimes after many years of incarceration, with few options to make good choices and lead a "normal life".

# The Path to Becoming a Leader

Membership Co-Coordinator Doris Phelps reminded members of the Soroptimist tradition of providing leadership training, before presenting the April 18 speaker Christi Cakiroglu. Christi was introduced by Mary Ann Mc Cauley, as she is partnering with Christi on providing services to nonprofits.

A Nevada native, Christi graduated from the University of Oregon. Upon returning to Reno, she held various positions with different nonprofit organizations. In 1999, she became the first Executive Director of Keep Truckee Meadows Beautiful. Retiring after 19 years, she founded CC Consulting Solutions devoted to nonprofit organizations.

Christi provided a glimpse into her journey to becoming a leader and imparted some wisdom she learned along the way. She believes everyone can become a leader. First is overcoming any insecurities about leadership, and then developing the baseline qualities for being a leader - caring, honesty, persistence and being able to adapt.

With many projects developed over time to make our area more sustainable and beautiful, Christi's greatest impact was on the One River consortium of local governments, agencies and other stakeholders working together. At times it was a daunting task to bring the varied interests together, however Christi concluded with her favorite quote, "If it was easy, somebody else would have

already done it."

The Importance of Food for a Healthy Life

Food is medicine. That's the bottom line for Cardiologist Dr. Lettia Anderson. She is the Immediate Past Chief of Staff with Sierra Nevada Medical Center and Governor of the American College of Cardiology Nevada. She's a passionate advocate for the importance of an ample supply of good food for the most vulnerable in our society. Without it, people are more likely to die in greater numbers and at an earlier age than the general population. Dr. Anderson has spent decades researching and documenting her findings

"Eighty percent of heart disease is preventable. Access to healthy food is vital to a healthy body," according to Dr. Anderson.

One of her passions is the establishment of what's called the Prescription Pantry. This is where qualified patients receive a food prescription for the most common conditions such as cardiovascular, diabetes and hypertension issues, to the pantry that prescribes appropriate food for the health of the patient, just like a medication from a pharmacy. The food is assembled for the patient take-away.

Appropriately, Dr. Anderson is a long-time member of the Board of Directors for the Food Bank of Northern Nevada, including pitching in at the distribution

She is currently championing a new project called the Oddie Project, enabled by bipartisan legislative mandate and supported by Governor Joe Lombardo. It will be located on the border between Reno and Sparks as it is an underserved, high-poverty area. It is envisioned to be a hub for childcare and food services. It is also planned to house a commercial grade production kitchen and office space for job placement.

# A New Modern Dormitory for Girls in Thulipokhari, Nepal

A little more than two decades in the making, a two-story dormitory, with rooftop garden, has risen amongst the lush green hillside of Thulipokhari, Nepal. The building is a testament to the vision, passion and hands-on work of Soroptimists, generous donors, present and past residents of Thulipokhari and the girls who will occupy it.

It's also a testament to today's modern conveniences and technology built in a location of the world where people live without such "advancements". The dormitory is outfitted with electricity, running water, indoor plumbing and bathrooms, and glass windows. Eight individual rooms house 32 girls. A connected building provides room for an on-site house mother, a gas-equipped kitchen with modern appliances and an open space for meals and meetings. Since the beginning, the cost per girl for tuition, room and board scholarship is \$300 per year. A \$1,200 donation will secure a scholarship for one girl for four years through the two-year high school studies and two-year baccalaureate studies.

The total cost for this new dormitory is approximately \$109,000. With the donation of the land from the Village Council of Thulipokhari, and the labor from the villagers,

## 20+ Years Educating Girls in Nepal

In the spring of 2000, a young man by the name of Purna Subedi spoke to Soroptimist International of Truckee Meadows members at a weekly meeting. He spoke of his upbringing and education in the small village of Thulipokhari Nepal.

Purna came to the U.S.in 1985 at the invitation of member Jeanne Baxter so that he could pursue his education. Today, Purna holds his doctorate degree in engineering and owns a business in southern California that produces software programs that power telecommunications and other satellites.

During Purina's presentation, members were most anxious to learn about the lives of girls in Nepal. Members learned that the majority of girls were not educated due to the cost. If families could raise money for schooling, they sent their boys. Another added barrier for girls was the long distances between the limited number of schools in Nepal. Girls would have to walk two-to-four hours one way, depending upon the season, to reach most schools. At that time, the literacy rate for girls in Nepal was only 14%, and 47% for boys.

SITM members pondered solutions. Providing scholarships solved only one-half of the problem. With Purna as the go-between, Soroptimists and the Village Council in Thulipokhari, a plan was hatched to build a

plus a waiver of the VAT taxes and fees, Soroptimists and other donors contributed approximately \$80,000 to the project. After breaking ground in 2023, the dormitory and all of its amenities will be ready for occupancy for the girls for the fall semester 2024.

#### girls' dormitory, where the Janata Sudarsham School was located. The girls could walk once a week to-andfrom home while receiving tuition, room and board.

Feverish fundraising began as SITM promised to pay for construction materials, while the villagers would pay for the land and labor. In May 2001, the first dormitory was completed at a cost of \$13,846US. In the fall, the first group of girls entered the dormitory. Barriers to at least 32 girls were removed and the two-year high school program for girls began.

#### Soroptimist International of Truckee Meadows

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Next came the yearly solicitation of donations for scholarships, along with what would become the first of 40 semi-annual SITM garage sales. In 2006, donations exceeding the necessary scholarships, plus garage sale proceeds were deposited into an endowment account with the Community Foundation of Western Nevada.

#### Here are a few milestones ...

#### 2003

The Animal Assistance Program was established to provide villagers with low interest loans to purchase water buffaloes, goats, chickens and beehives. Principal payments were used for new loans. Interest on loans was used to support the girls' dormitory.

#### 2005

Two small solar panels were installed on the dormitory roof to power a battery used to provide minimal lighting in the dormitory replace the oil lamps previously used.

#### 2007

Nearly 300 girls have been provided with scholarships.

#### 2010

More than 500 girls have been educated and the literacy rate for girls in Nepal jumped from14% to 30%. More than 100 families have taken advantage of the Animal Assistance Program.

#### 2012

Four SITM members visited the dormitory and the village. Women in the village began forming Mother's Club modeled after Soroptimist. A brick security wall was constructed around the dormitory at a cost of \$2,300. An additional \$1,860 was sent to upgrade the dormitory kitchen with gas stove, modern kitchenware and utensils and propane cylinders.

#### 2013

Following SITM's visit, the club donated a variety of seeds and watering apparatus to the Mothers Groups to begin the Vital Seeds program.

#### 2015

A magnitude 7.8 earthquake struck central Nepal. Through public awareness and community support, SITM raised \$18,500 in Emergency Assistance Disaster Relief funds for immediate assistance to the families in Thulipokhari to provide food, water, temporary shelters, such as tents and tarps, plus materials to rehabilitate damaged homes and buildings.

#### 2016

SITM gains international recognition when its project is selected to be one of the three grant recipients of SI President Yvonne Simpson's President's Appeal project, "Educate to Lead, Nepal". SITM received two \$20,000 grants for scholarships and literacy. SITM hosted special guests SI President Yvonne Simpson, SI Assistant Director of Advocacy Sharon Fischer, Past SIA Presidents Cheri Fleming and Poco Davis, and SIA Federation President Samantha "Sam" Buchenau for a special presentation by Dr. Purna Subedi.

Also attending from Nepal were Project Scholarship Chairman Guru Prasad Subedi, his wife Nundakali and son Mahesh Subedi.

#### 2017

Monica House and husband Steve Friedlander visit Thulipokhari and meet with the village council and the Mothers Groups.

A \$14,000 grant from Soroptimist International enabled the establishment of a computer lab at the school for the students and training for women in the Mothers Clubs to use the computers. The lab consists of six desktop and six laptops, computer desks and tables, along with a computer instructor.

#### 2019

SITM sent funds to send the girls on a field trip; visiting other villages and cities, schools, government buildings, and plantation.

#### 2021

Twenty years of occupancy by hundreds of girls, the original dormitory is beginning to show its age and limited amenities. There was never electricity or running water, Latrines were located behind the dormitory. For many years food was cooked over an open fire and windows were only closeable to winter rain and cold by wooden shutters.

SITM commissioned an engineering design to explore the possibilities and costs of building a new dormitory.

#### 2022

With design complete and the Village Council on board, SITM approved construction of a new dormitory and began fundraising to cover the costs. To date, more than 2,000 girls have graduated from the program. The literacy rate for girls in Nepal has risen to 47%

#### 2023

Ground is broken to begin construction.

#### 2024

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# **EmpowHER Luncheon Raises Funds for Girls in Nepal**

On April 24, 2024, Soroptimist International of Sierra Reno hosted the "2024 EmpowerHer Luncheon" at the National Automobile Museum, a fundraising luncheon featuring an update on SISR's and Soroptimist International of Truckee Meadows' (SITM) long-standing project to "Remove Barriers to Education for Girls in Thulipokhari, Nepal".

More than two decades in the making, the project now boasts a new dormitory for girls, replacing the original dormitory built in 2001. The new structure features modern conveniences not available 13 years ago.

Judge Connie Steinheimer from SISR welcomed 200 guests, including 18 members and their guests from SITM, to a multimedia program connecting Reno to Thulipokhari, Nepal campus and dormitory administrators and the girls; Dr. Purna Subedi in southern California; and Past SI President Sharon Fisher in Vancouver, Canada.



SITM members and guests attended the luncheon.

Monica House presented a comprehensive picture of the beginnings of the project for girls, showing plenty of photo examples of the progress and expansion over the years, plus how the project has provided benefits to the village of Thulipokhari.
